Robust research on personnel retention tells us that two often overlooked, but proven variables are key to staff retention and well-being: voice and appreciation. This workshop boosts clinical leaders' skill to enhance both. There will be practical exercises to plan and practice two conversational techniques leaders can enact to create a magnetic, high-performance, and compassionate culture around them. The first highlights "the value of being valued" to build a culture of appreciation. The second focuses on improving performance in everyday clinical practice by holding people to high standards while holding them in high regard. Participants can expect to leave with two practical interventions they can apply immediately and relying on Jenny's 20 years coaching clinical leaders, up the learning curve on these skills.
